Traveling the Backroads of Texas - Rockport/Fulton...Charm of the Texas Coast

Rockport [pop. 7400] is the county seat of Aransas County and was first developed about 1865 as a cattle processing and shipping center. It was nearly destroyed by a hurricane in 1919, but the residents quickly rebuilt and by 1925 it became a fishing and shipbuilding center on the Gulf Coast.

The town of Fulton joins Rockport on the north. Today this area is a vibrant community, encouraging both tourism and relocation to the place residents call



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"Paradise".

There are dozens of great places to stay in Rockport/Fulton. From outstanding resorts, to hotels, RV Parks, fishing lodges, and charming Bed and Breakfasts in historic homes, visitors to the area have a wonderful variety of choices.

I began my visit with a stop at the Rockport/Fulton Visitors Center, located near the waterfront and across the street from many of Rockport's main attractions. The helpful staff will help you with great handouts on local museums, art galleries, dining places, and hotels. Many attractions are only open Tuesday through Saturday and I began my tour on Wednesday morning. I was surprised at the number of wonderful attractions in Rockport which are free to the public.



The Rockport Art Center is an attractive onestory building, filled with paintings, sculpture, pottery, and jewelry creations from outstanding local artists. The friendly docents and the open, clean design of the galleries add to the experience. The exhibited artwork changes monthly and is for sale. The center also has a nice gift shop.

Inspired by the artwork, I headed down to the Austin Street art galleries. The Austin Street area is filled with wonderful art galleries and shops, including Salt Flats Gallery, Coastal Creations Art Galley, St. Charles Gallery, Estelle Stair Gallery, 4 the Birds, Paradise House, and the eclectic Flying Pig Emporium. My purchases included a wooden carving, a hand-thrown pottery mug, and a vintage magazine. Lots of on street parking allows you to wander up and down the street and really enjoy the area.

There are many great places to eat in Rockport and recommended restaurants included JD's Seafood, the Chartroom, Shempy's Grill, Panjo's Pizza and Pasta, Latitude 28.02, Jalisco Mexican Restaurant, Rosita's Taqueria, and Rockport Bakery. Charlotte Plummer's Seafare Restaurant and the Moondog Restaurant are among those located nearby in Fulton. I was only able to sample a few, but look forward to finishing the list the next time.

In the afternoon I returned to the harbor area and visited the Bay Education Center. The Center includes informative displays and hands-on activities highlighting the Mission-Aransas Estuary and its ecology. The center also sponsors lectures and educational workshops. Located in the center is Science on a Sphere, a fascinating lecture and program with computerized video display on a giant sphere suspended in the middle of the room. The subjects of the talks change during the week and visitors are encouraged to return.

Rockport/Fulton is on the Texas Birding Trail and there are many quiet places to walk and bird-watch. During my stay I visited the Rockport Demonstration Bird Garden and Wetlands Pond. This park includes a garden of native plants chosen to attract hummingbirds and a boardwalk and observation platform for viewing the birds and wildlife around the wetlands pond. Late afternoon found me at Goose Island State Park searching for whooping cranes and the legendary Big Tree. The park is a wonderful place for camping, fishing, and picnicking on the beach. One of the best places to see the seasonal whooping cranes is an open field in the nearby town of Lamar. The site of the Big Tree, a live oak believed to be over 1,000 years old, is now part of Goose Island State Park but is also located in Lamar. The trunk of this huge tree is over 35 feet in circumference and the ancient oak is protected by a fence with informative signs nearby.



The Visitors Center also recommended a walk on the beautiful Rockport Beach and the Copano Causeway Pier and a visit to the Connie Hagar Cottage Sanctuary, a featured stop on the Great Texas Coastal Birding Trail.



On Thursday I headed for the harbor area again and visited the Texas Maritime Museum. This museum is one of seven on the Texas coast forming the LaSalle Odyssey, and features artifacts recovered from the 1684 ship LaBelle and a large scale model of the ship. Other exhibits include displays on coastal shipbuilding and boating, Texas lighthouses, offshore oil recovery, and sport and commercial fishing. The third floor tower offers a great view of the bay and the town. This is a fun and informative museum for the whole family. The Aquarium at Rockport Harbor is open Thursday through Monday in the afternoon and is another free attraction for the whole family. Informative displays educate about the bay ecology and marine life and large tanks are full of local

fish and marine animals. My favorite was the five-foot

eel, who was very active while I was there. Next door is the Education Center which shows a continuous variety of excellent short videos on ocean life. We were greeted by Capt. Dar and enjoyed a video about venomous sea creatures which was fascinating.



Friday morning we were on hand for the morning tour of the Fulton Mansion. This beautiful historic French Second Empire style home was built by cattle baron George W. Fulton in 1877. The interior of the ornate, 3-story mansion was filled with modern conveniences not seen in south Texas at that time, including gas lighting, central heating, and hot and cold running water for bathtubs and flush toilets. The beautifully restored rooms contain period furniture, some original, and give a great insight to the Fulton family life. Although the mansion withstood over 100 years of coastal storms, our tour guide stated that the building is now showing signs of its age, and will be closed for extensive exterior restoration this spring. Our guides were very knowledgeable and informative, and we enjoyed the tour.



After leaving Fulton, we headed north to the Aransas National Wildlife Refuge, winter home for many whooping cranes. The 59,000 acre refuge spreads across tidal marshes, blackjack prairie, and grasslands, and protects a wide variety of birds and wildlife. The park is home to over 390 species of birds, deer, javalinas, bobcats, and alligators. I was greeted at the first viewing area by an alligator basking on the bank. There are short walking trails and two observation towers which give a breathtaking view of the bay and wetlands.

We were joined on the tallest tower by a number of vultures, who consider this a great place to observe the countryside as well. A 16-mile auto tour is available, leading back into the heart of the refuge. Driving slowly to spot wildlife, the tour took about an hour. We ended up spending over two hours in the refuge and could have easily stayed longer. Early morning is one of the best times to visit, so remember to bring your binoculars, bug spray for the mosquitos, and a picnic lunch.

Of course, sport fishing is one of the top outdoor activities on the Texas coast, and Aransas County has three harbors, Rockport, Fulton, and Cove Harbor, which provide fishing and boating services. Another popular fishing spot is the Copano Bay State Fishing Pier. Beside numerous fishing piers, boat docks, and beach front parks, the Rockport/Fulton area is home to many fishing guides and charter boats. Check with the Visitors Center for more information.



Madisonville Sidewalk Cattlemen's Association's - 74th Annual Steak Dinner and Dance on May 3

The Madisonville Sidewalk Cattlemen's Association (MSCA) is an organization that pokes fun at the non-cattlemen who have worn their cowboy boots within the boundaries of Madison County. Unwary boot wearers who are unable to prove that they own at least two head of cattle should be prepared for a ceremonial dunking in the watering trough on the courthouse lawn.

This tradition all began when Henry Fox, the editor of the Madisonville Meteor in 1941, noted that there were many young men habitually loitering on the sidewalks of the town square wearing cowboy boots and discussing cattle yet owned no cattle themselves. "Sidewalk Cattlemen" was coined by Mr. Fox to describe those cowboys.

The idea took hold and a local doctor, Jesse B. Heath, organized the first meeting of the Madisonville Sidewalk Cattlemen's Association on March 25, 1941. A complete set of "boot wearing regulations" was formed along with infraction penalties. The owners of two head

of cattle are entitled to wear cowboy boots; owners of three head may wear boots with one pants leg stuffed into the top of the boot; owners of four head may stuff both pants legs into the boots; and owners of six head of cattle may wear cowboy boots with both pants legs stuffed in and spurs. Violators receive the customary dunk in the horse trough.

The MSCA is the oldest continually running non-profit in the state of Texas. It affords an air of good humor and fun as it plays host to a steak dinner and barbeque cookoff. Funds raised provide scholarships for local Madison County students.

This year's 74th Annual Steak Dinner and Dance is on May 3rd and will feature National Recording Artist Joe Diffie. Diffie has recorded 20 Top 10 singles and 13 albums which include the chart toppers "Pickup Man," "Third Rock from the Sun," and "John Deere Green."
